### Thursday, May 11<sup>th</sup>: **Exposing Imperialism in Haiti**

Cuba, 2014, 70 min. Minute by minute, how the U.S. coup d'etat in Haiti over-turned a democratic (but anti-big-business) government and installed a police state obedient to Wall Street. Live footage of how the U.S. "restores democracy" abroad.



### Thursday, May 25<sup>th</sup>: **Do Not Resist**

USA, 2017, 72 min.; Tribeca Best Documentary. A stunning look at America's newly militarized police forces: from a ride-along with a South Carolina SWAT team to a police training seminar that teaches "righteous violence" to real scenes of soldier cops in action in Ferguson.



### Thursday, June 8<sup>th</sup>: **The Other Side of Immigration**

USA, 2009, 56 min. Why so many people leave the Mexican countryside to work in the U.S. and what happens to the families and communities left behind. A fresh perspective on undocumented immigration and an invitation to rethink the question.



### Thursday, June 22<sup>nd</sup>: **The Killing\$ of Tony Blair**

UK, 2016, 95 min. Tony Blair deceitfully destroyed the Labour Party as leader (while pocketing billions), deceitfully sold the country the Iraq war as Prime Minister (idem), yet today is honored as a man of peace and faith. The film shows how he pulled it off.

### Thursday, October 12<sup>th</sup>: **I Am Not Your Negro**

France/USA, 2017, 93 min. "The story of the Negro in America is the story of America, and it is not a pretty story," writes James Baldwin. The film recounts the lives and assassinations of his close friends: Medgar Evers, Malcolm X and Martin Luther King, Jr.
